

GREAT NEED GREATER LOVE


Parents in Haiti had school uniforms made and asked if they could sneak their children into our schools. The school directors and local pastors showed love and concern, and did not deny them a seat in the classrooms. However, when we began enrolling students for the 2018-2019 school year, these unregistered students wanted official enrollment. When asked for approval I said, "Yes, do not turn them away." Yet, I failed to ask the important question: "How many are there?"

The meeting already happened and the decision was made. Don't turn away the children. But Jesus called the children to Him and said, "Let the little children come unto me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these." (Luke 18:16). Then, the surprise arrived...enrollment increased by 1,000 students in just six short months.

Through this, I have been much more aware of the desperation of parents and their children. We saw a great need and God matched it with a greater love. When you give to the *Life of a Child* fund, you help us say "yes" to the additional 1,000 students. However, we now have nearly 2,500 unsponsored children we're providing with food, an education, and medical care. I'm praying for a miracle and trusting God to provide. ~Tim DeTellis

DR MINISTRY UPDATE

We started a Christian leadership group in our high school last year with nine students. This school year, we have more than doubled the number of students who started the program—20 students in total! One of our key verses for the group is 1 Timothy 4:12: "Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith and in purity." We are working with the students weekly, teaching them Biblical principles of leadership and giving them opportunities to put those principles into practice.

This school year, we have had a chance to get even more involved in our high school. The students recently prepared and led the junior high and high school chapels. In 2019, we plan to lead more chapel services and participate in community events. Additionally, we have paired each of our leadership students with a child from our school in Redemption Village who needs some additional help in their classes. They will be mentoring and tutoring them during the school year. Please pray for these students as they grow in their faith and share God's love with others. ~Heather Williams Katz

SNEAKERS FOR HAITI

The November mission team was privileged to do a sneaker distribution at our school in L'Acul, Haiti. We had just received 3,060 pairs of beautiful canvas, high-top sneakers donated by a member of Cornerstone Church in Long Beach, California. The students loved them! Many of them were wide-eyed and in disbelief that they received such a cool pair of shoes! Recently, someone asked me if all the students got sneakers. I replied by saying last school year we only had enough sneakers for about a third of our schools.

Purchasing shoes is a big expense for the very poor in Haiti. This year, we'd love to see each of our students receive a new pair of shoes. Because all Haitian schools use uniforms, the black sneakers are prized most highly. Children may wear any shoes to our schools, but culturally they prefer the black ones—but ALL are very much appreciated. For some students the pair of shoes worn to school is the only pair they own. A big thank you to all who have donated sneakers for our students.



HOW DO YOU PRAY?

It doesn't matter how you pray or your position...whether you are sitting, standing or kneeling. But it does matter that you pray and that you pray constantly, as the Bible admonishes us to pray without ceasing. Now is the time to pray!

There are times when I pray using a position of prayer that I learned from spending some time in India. I kneel on the floor with my full body in front of me, and my head touching the floor. For me, it creates a true feeling of intimacy and connection with God.

PRAY FIRST

When I look at the life of Jesus, I admire His discipline and dependence on prayer. When it comes to prayer, communicating to God was even the utmost priority for Jesus. He knew the importance to pray first. "Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed." (Mark 1:35).

How did Jesus pray? He prayed for God to **forgive others.** "Jesus said, 'Father, forgive them, for they don't know what they are doing." (Luke 23:34). Jesus prayed for God's will to be done. "He went on a little farther and bowed with His face to the ground, praying, 'My Father! If it is possible, let this cup of suffering be taken away from me. Yet I **JESUS PRAYED AND**

want Your will to be done, not mine." (Matthew 26:39). Jesus prayed for guidance. "But Jesus often withdrew to lonely places and prayed." (Luke 5:16).

He prayed for His disciples and believers. "Holy *Father, protect them by the power of Your name—the* name you gave me—so that they may be one as we are one." (John 17:11). Jesus gave thanks. "While they were eating, Jesus took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, 'Take it; this is my body." (Mark 14:22).

Recently, I was interviewed for a podcast and was asked what new routine or habit did I want to start for 2019?" I replied, "Pray more." The Apostle Paul wrote: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (1 Thes. 5:16-18). Then the

Apostle Paul reminded us the Holy Spirit intercedes on our behalf as he wrote about in Romans 8:26. "In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans."

On a recent flight to speak at Family Church in Middletown, NY, the airplane door closed and I turned on my "pray playlist" and began to listen to "Thy Will" by Hillary Scott. Often, I simply pray, "God I trust You." As I surrender in my heart and mind the concerns I may have, peace begins to fill my heart.

Speaking at a church is like going on a mission

trip for me. I fly somewhere new and arrive at a church—gathering with people I may have never met. My prayer is: "How may I add value to the people in this place?" I want to encourage

them in their faith. Before I ever arrive, and say one word from the stage, I pray for months in advance.

My favorite spot on an airplane is by the window. I enjoy seeing the earth below and can rest against the body of the aircraft. My favorite time to fly is at sunset or sunrise. To see the sun break over the layer of clouds is breathtaking. I am reminded that wherever you go, God is already there. Whatever you may be about to face, God has gone ahead of you.

As we begin this new year, may we pray first. Let's pray for forgiveness, for God's will to be done, for guidance, protection, and in all things let us give thanks. ~Tim DeTellis

BUILDING A NEW HAITI

It is a daunting task constructing and maintaining our school and church locations in Haiti. Thank the Lord for willing laborers. Haitian workers are eager to rebuild their country. Site inspections take place at every location, and projects are prioritized. Sometimes roofs are painted and others actually need the roofing trusses and metal roofs replaced. In other cases an inferior building needs to be torn down and rebuilt. Currently, 200 school benches are being made. Infrastructure plays a vital role with enabling our schools and churches to function. We average six new school/church buildings each year. All building materials are purchased in Haiti, and the work is completed entirely by Haitian crews. Our most common tradesmen are: masons, carpenters, and painters. In addition, we hire even more specialized tradesmen such as electricians, plumbers, and metal fabricators.

Thank you for partnering with us in building a new Haiti. The school children love seeing their schools painted and new benches being delivered. Rebuilding and making repairs have been unending since the earthquake. Fifty construction projects have been completed since 2010. We have another 50 buildings that still need to be constructed. All glory to the Lord for His strength, protection, and provision. We are eager to keep meeting the needs here in Haiti.

DR HEALTH CENTER

Last year, at our health center in the Dominican Republic, we treated an average of over 770 patients each month. These patients come for general medical consultations, minor emergency services, blood pressure and diabetes screenings, and free medication. We also treat many patients who have wounds on their skin. The majority of these patients have diabetic ulcers or burns from accidents. They come multiple times during the week for sterile dressing changes.

One such patient is José del Rosario. He suffered multiple second-degree burns from a motor vehicle accident. After being in the hospital for one month, he came to our clinic for continued treatment of his burns. He has been coming almost daily for three months and will continue to come until his burns have healed. They are healing and he is so thankful for the care and attention he has received at the health center. He is one of the many patients who have benefited from the care we give. We are thankful that we can share God's love with people as we minister to them by helping meet their medical needs.

TEACHER WORKSHOP

One the most influential people in the life of a child is their teacher. The teachers at our elementary schools spend hours with their students in their classrooms, and are also part of the church and community where the students live. At New Missions in Haiti we employ 264 elementary school teachers. Not only do these teachers pour into the students' lives academically, but also spiritually during their Bible time each day.

In November, we invited 174 of our first through sixth grade teachers to a workshop day held at our high school. There were morning and afternoon sessions. The teachers from the 30 schools also enjoyed lunch together. I was blessed to be able to greet and speak briefly to the teachers at the beginning of the day. I encouraged them to see the importance of their influence in the lives of their students and to recognize that each of them has a mission. We want to continue to empower our teachers by holding three workshop days each year—drawing from talent and resources in Haiti. LOVE CHANGES EVERYTHING

Why do we do what we do? Because God first loved us—we share His love with others. From a ministry perspective, our mission is most effective when the Gospel becomes personal. We can preach, teach, and even evangelize. However, when someone claims Jesus as Lord of their life, then the life change begins.

In Haiti, water baptism is a defining moment in the life of a believer. Many will attend church because it is a good thing to do. Some will even say they are a Christian because they agree with the truths of Scripture. However, they will not declare Jesus as Lord of their life. At all of our churches, we encourage and invite believers to follow in water baptism—as an outward expression of their inward faith in Christ.

Recently, at our New Missions church in Concrab, Haiti, we welcomed churches from across the Leogane Plain to gather for a water baptism festival. I've attended these before, but this time the service was hosted mid-afternoon. Students who had just finished school were able to attend the festival. My heart was overwhelmed with joy to see so many kids watching the obedience of others who made the decision to follow Jesus. Only the love of Christ changes lives forever. THE MARK OF LOVE

"BY THIS EVERYONE WILL

KNOW THAT YOU ARE

MY DISCIPLES IF YOU

LOVE ONE ANOTHER."

JOHN 13:35

I greet you with a holy kiss. Romans 16:16 instructs us to greet our brothers and sisters in Christ with a holy kiss. Isn't it strange how we read the Word, and believe it is God speaking to us, but then conclude that things have changed, and it is not really relevant today? That is the tension between the Word of God and our culture. What is truly relevant is the unchanging Word of God—yesterday, today and forever. Our brothers and sisters in Christ are our family now and forever. Remember what Jesus said when told that His mother and brothers were looking for Him? He said,

"My mother and brothers are those who hear God's word and put it into practice." (Luke 8:21). We tenderly need to desire, to engage, and to greet each other and encourage the mark of love—a kiss.

This was and still is the Biblical teaching and culture of my home church in Boston, Massachusetts. On occasion, the pastor will remind the men that to give a holy kiss is to give a pecking kiss on the cheek!

A baby responds to kissing and learns to kiss before they communicate with words. A kiss! How important can that sign of love be for some in our community who may be alone, separated from family, or challenged with health issues, relationships, and financial struggles? Give them a holy kiss. Let your touch be a mark of love because they will know we are Christians by our love. John 13:35 says, "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples if you love one another."

I enjoy identifying with the Shulammite woman in the book in the Bible, Song of Solomon. Some pastors shy away from preaching from this book, but it is His Word to us on love, marriage, fidelity and courtship. I identify with this woman. I understand. I also have had passion and desire and this book confirms that to desire love is normal, and also the design and plan of the One who kisses us—Jesus Himself. In chapter 1, verse 1, she says to her lover, "Kiss me."

Even Jesus desired to be kissed. His words in Luke 7:45 are: "YOU GAVE ME NO KISS!"

> We are blessed with those events in life when we feel the kiss of God—a new relationship, a new career, an opportunity to be used of God, or just feeling a kiss from God in finding a parking space in a busy town. A kiss from God can be a pleasant surprise. My husband and I were representing

our mission in Athens, Alabama, and at one of the events a woman was introduced from Wyoming. As it turned out, she grew up on the same street and went to the same schools as my husband, Ted. That was a sweet kiss!

Our mark of love can be a time to renew and remember and to practice God's Word to greet in love with a holy kiss. I appreciate your love to give your brother and sister a holy kiss. I ask God to let His kisses continuously touch your life every day.

DR INDEPENDENCE DAY

Every year, during the month of February, our schools and students in the Dominican Republic celebrate and remember their freedom. The DR declared its independence from Haiti in 1844 after years of being under Spanish, French and Haitian rule. Independence Day is February 27, and on this day our schools participate in a parade through the streets of Sosua with other schools in the area. According to one of our school directors, Keyla Mercado, Independence Day is the biggest Dominican celebration of the year.

Throughout part of the month of January and for the entire month of February, the schools are decked out with Dominican flags. The students help decorate the classrooms and outdoor common areas. This year, there was even a contest to see who could decorate their classroom areas the best. Selected students also practice marches each day—learning a good variety of them as they prepare for the Independence Day parade. Through these activities, students learn more about loving and respecting their country. At New Missions, it is our goal to develop Christian leaders who will love God and show love and respect for their country.

HIGH SCHOOL PRAYER GROUP

The students pray for their families, school, and nation. Pray that God will grow and strengthen this group and use it to bring many more to Him.

In 1976 I was a 15-year-old sophomore at West Boylston High School. My English teacher, Mr. Kendall, caught me cheating on an exam and gave me an F grade. Then, I missed two exams, and by April I ended up in a situation where I was going to have to repeat sophomore English. Struggling and in with the wrong group of kids, I convinced my parents to let me move to Worcester and live alone in an apartment inside of our church at 135 Belmont Street, Worcester, Massachusetts. We were already

planning to sell our house and move to Worcester. I transferred from West Boylston to the Worcester school district. Our church was in the inner city, and I was sent to North High School Annex. It

was a school just for high school sophomores that met in an ancient building on Walnut Street in downtown Worcester. That was the last year the building was used for a public school. As a small boy who was an outsider to these city kids, I was an easy target. I started to skip school. One morning around 10:00 the phone at the church was ringing. I answered the phone, and it was Ellen from the school office calling to ask why George was not in school today. I replied, "George needs to help me do some work today." She said, "OK. Be sure he is in school tomorrow." The next day she called again and asked why George was not in school. I replied, "George needs to help me work again today." She yelled back, "George, you get down to this school right now!" I hung up on her. I was caught. I decided to run away. I knew a Christian guy who had played the guitar for my Dad

at some Christian events. I knew where he lived in Southbridge, and hitchhiked to his home...showing up at his door with a suitcase filled with clothes. He was friendly and welcoming. After a few days, he said I should call my father. I did... but would not tell him where I was... but agreed to call him again. By the end of the week, it was time to go home. I called my Dad, and he suggested we meet for lunch at a famous seafood restaurant on Main Street in Worcester. Dad was all love and didn't ask any questions. We

> had a big lunch together—all smiles and laughs—the prodigal son had come home. I never went back to high school. Fortunately, my father did live to see me graduate as I walked across

the stage at Rollins College to receive my Master's degree in Business Administration in 2002. Dad was proud that day.



In contrast, preparing two million meals a year for our ever rising student enrollment in Haiti has serious economic restraints. Sometimes we are able to purchase a salted fish along with tomato sauce to compliment the cornmeal cooked with beans. My favorite cook of over 30 years, Sister Ann, knows how to make the best rice and beans with her secret ingredient of a few whole cloves.

When the children arrive at school, they love to walk by the kitchen to smell the delicious aroma of the food being prepared for their lunch. Then, they can relax, focus, listen and learn. We have 56 "Mommas" who cook for New Missions. I was inspired, and I hope I was inspiring to them, as I met with our cooks in January... and I plan to meet with them again soon. I hope to gift each cook with the biggest, strongest, stainless steel cooking spoon. And I want them to walk to work with their spoon, head held high—as proud as any lawyer carrying a briefcase. These "Mommas" are changing the world each day, by loving and feeding God's children, and enabling a healthy future in Haiti.

DR WOMEN'S HEALTH EVENT

In the past year here in the DR, we have been saddened to hear of many women in the area dying from complications during labor or shortly after giving birth. In an effort to help prevent more maternal deaths, we recently hosted a two-day women's health event at our health center. We want to thank Francine Rollock, DeDe Taverner and Julia MacNeil for their help in making this event a success!

During this event, we performed thorough checks of all the pregnant women—including an ultrasound. We also taught them about nutrition, exercises, breastfeeding, pregnancy complications and how to recognize and/or prevent them. Twenty pregnant women attended the event and we plan to meet with them monthly to continue teaching and supporting them. After they give birth and return home, we will visit them in their home to check the mom and baby—making sure they are in good health. We look forward to seeing how God will use this ministry to be a blessing for the women in Sosua.

OUR GREATEST HOPE

During the weeks leading up to Easter, we naturally reflect upon the death and resurrection of our Lord and Savior. Personally, it's a time when I reexamine my own faith and commitment to God.

The crucifixion of Jesus is recorded in Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Three years prior, Jesus even prophesied His own death to His disciples in Mark 8:31. "He then began to teach them that the Son of Man must suffer many things and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that He must be killed and after three days rise again."

Jesus' death on the cross is vitally important because without it, we would have no hope of forgiveness or eternal life. Jesus paid the debt of our sins upon the cross, though He was sinless. He was the perfect sacrifice for our sins. Romans 5:8 tells us, "But God demonstrates His own

love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." We no longer need to live with guilt and shame. We need to walk in newness of life. "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new." 2 Corinthians 5:17

In the last moment before He died Jesus said, "It is finished! Father, into your hands I commit my Spirit." Jesus acknowledges that He completed His work. He knew His mission was to give His life as a sacrifice to redeem mankind. As Jesus took His last breath, the earth shook, and the temple curtain was torn. The graves of the saints opened—as their bodies were raised from the dead.

After His death, the following details are described in Matthew 27: "As evening approached, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who had himself become a disciple of Jesus. Going to Pilate, he asked for Jesus' body, and Pilate ordered that it be given to him. Joseph took the body, wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and placed it in his own new tomb that he had cut out of the rock. He rolled a big stone in front of the entrance to the tomb and went away."

However, of equal importance is the resurrection of Christ—as this proved Jesus indeed was the Son of God—conquering death and the grave. The death

> and resurrection of Jesus Christ is the foundation of the Christian faith. We no longer need to fear death. In John 11:25-26 Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in Me, though he die, yet shall

he live, and everyone who lives and believes in Me shall never die."

Our greatest hope is that we also will rise again from the dead. My dad always said the day he went to glory would be his greatest day. This is promised to us in John 5:28-29: "Do not be amazed at this, for a time is coming when all who are in their graves will hear His voice and come out—those who have done what is good will rise to live, and those who have done what is evil will rise to be condemned."

"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope." Romans 15:13

SNEAKERS FOR HAITIANS

I've seen our Haitian children walk to school carrying their shoes, and then wash their feet before putting their shoes on to enter the school. I've heard of some morning students sharing the same shoes with a sibling or neighbor who goes to an afternoon school. And I have also witnessed children walking barefoot every day on gravel/stone or muddy roads—most likely full of bacteria from the lack of sanitation in their villages. Children walking barefoot can get cuts, infections, hookworms and roundworms—leading to further illnesses.

During the cholera outbreak, not one of our students contacted this deadly disease because of aggressive education and the provision of soap and water. Why are children still barefooted? It's not their fault. Many parents don't have work in a country with a constant 85 percent unemployment rate. Some parents do have minimum paying jobs earning about \$5 a day. With that pay, they would need \$21 to buy a pair of shoes for a 10-year-old child. We have close to 10,000 students, and we would love to give each one a pair of new shoes every year.

I ask that you prayerfully consider buying sneakers to help cover the feet of our students. What a joy it will be to go from village to village, and from school to school in Haiti—seeing children wearing their new sneakers. Thank you! ~Jeanne DeTellis Loudon

TEACHER CERTIFICATION

Haiti's Department of Education does not have laws governing education certification for teachers. In the early days of the mission we employed those we could find in the area. At our schools we only want to use certified teachers. The Department of Education is working with us to provide training and testing to certify the ones who are already teaching.

In April, we had two days of training for all of our 265 elementary teachers. The response from the teachers regarding the value of the seminars has been overwhelmingly positive. Those who are already certified are thankful for the refresher courses, and those seeking certification feel very blessed—as many have already been teaching for years, have families and other responsibilities, and are unable to return to school to get this certification on their own.

The teachers left the seminars feeling that their "tools" for teaching had been sharpened. They covered topics like lesson preparation and presentation, as well as evaluation of learning. Equipping our teachers and school directors not only blesses them, but also each and every student. ~Rachel DeTellis

Do you live a distracted life? I know I do. More than ever I'm finding my schedule can pull me in many directions, and my attention is being tugged at nonstop. For 2019, the average time people spend on social media daily is 116 minutes. From cloud based video services to TV on demand with endless channels, there are more distractions than ever. I remember in college I had a goal to own 100 CDs and now with streaming music, our music libraries are greater than the time we have to listen to what's available. With all this tug of attention, I am finding a greater need to pause, focus, and pray. Psalm 46:10

makes it clear to "Be still, and know that I am God! I will be honored by every nation. I will be honored throughout the world." How am I honoring God with my time?

I confess, I am not being still enough. However, prayer is helping me be less distracted and pay attention to God and listen to the needs of others. Since January of this year, I have made "prayer" my word for the year. Little did I know how it would impact those close to me.

It was 9:09 p.m. and my phone received a text message from a pastor friend. Surrendering to God my prayers for my friend, I began to trust in faith for God to meet him at his point of need. Waiting and trusting is hard. In those long pause moments God is at work and we wait to see all He is up to. Then two days later he texted me an update: "Everything looked good on the test. Thanks for the prayers. I really appreciate it." I replied: "GLORY!!!!! Thank you Jesus!"

As I write this, I am in a season of extra prayer for my wife—as she is searching for a new job. At home, I have a prayer chair where I go to focus my heart and mind. One evening, I sat down and began to pray for

> my wife. Tears began to flow. My heart was overwhelmed. Then I sensed a comforting response from the Lord: "I already have it figured out." I wanted to know even more so I prayed harder, asking for clarity

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

Let's keep the local church a priority, because gathering together is when church happens. ~Tim DeTellis

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

Do you know anyone who is suffering? Some people have asked, "Is God good? Is He powerful? Does He exist?" Since sin came into the world through Adam and Eve, there is suffering.

And yet I see my heavenly Father of grace and mercy watching over my dad. The whole family and village loves him, visits him, and brings him favorite foods (some even use supermarket delivery service). When I am giving him personal care, his heart is expressing gratitude as he thanks me and prays blessings over me and our family.

I know my father is living each day in victory by God's grace. His unheard prayer is similar to how Job felt in Job 13:15, "Though He slay me, YET will I trust Him." Dad is not walking much, and their family room now holds a hospital bed. He is still very social, and when he is not napping, I hear him praying out loud and the room vibrates with a divine presence—much like one of the world's greatest cathedrals.

During this season of life for my father, there are caregivers coming in and out of their home on a regular basis. Medically speaking, my dad needs to be in a nursing home. We are proud and stubborn

> Italians, and we three sisters are in unity—wanting dad happy at home until he takes his last breath on earth and sees Jesus. Dad would prefer one of us to be there 24/7 for him. I tried to ease

his adjustment to strangers coming and going to care for him. "Dad, God is going to be sending people in and out of your home and you are going to have an opportunity to show them Jesus." Yes, God can help you to preach louder and with more conviction when you are suffering...sharing your lot in life with humanity. Oh, for grace to trust Him more.

Perhaps you may be suffering or you share the sufferings of humanity in hearing the world news. Suffering is part of being human. But when the spiritual interacts in our suffering, our God lifts us above our suffering. Our suffering is not in vain. My parents still believe for a miraculous healing with a sweet surrender to trust...though He slay me. We are so grateful for such marvelous grace given to us by our loving Father. ~Jeanne DeTellis Loudon

My father turned 101 on the thirtieth of May. Mother has had a miracle healing from high blood pressure; she is on no medication and loves to take care of Dad-including looking after him at night, and feeding him with food and the Word. HAVE I NOT COMMANDED YOU?

HAVE YOU EVER

DOUBTED AND

DISAPPOINTED GOD?

After the time of Moses, God spoke to Joshua with these words, "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and of good courage; do not be afraid, nor be dismayed. For the Lord your God is with you wherever you go" (Joshua 1:9). Imagine Joshua, who was now about 68 years old, standing atop a mountain looking down on the Promised Land of Canaan. As Joshua stood there staring at the Promised Land, for the second time in his life there were still voices of doubt. This was the land God had promised to the Israelites as an inheritance 40 years earlier. When

Joshua was in his thirties, he had spied out the land and gave a good report that the people of Israel should invade the land at once and conquer the cities. But the people were afraid and did not put their faith in God. As punishment

for their unbelief, they wandered in the desert for 40 years. God was giving Joshua a second chance to be the military commander who would conquer the lands promised to the Israelites. In that moment, God commands Joshua to be strong and of good courage and not to be afraid, because the Lord God promised to be with Joshua and to be the strength that would provide the victory. The point is that we are to be strong and courageous—not in our personal abilities—but in the Word of God whose promises we can stand on for strength in the battles of life. God is commanding us also to have faith in Him, in the same way He commanded Joshua. The same promise that He gave to Joshua He is also giving to us. He will be with us wherever we go.

Have you ever doubted and disappointed God? Was there ever a time you were afraid to do something God wanted you to do? The Israelites doubted and disappointed God. We can examine the life of Peter, Jesus' disciple. Did Peter disappoint Jesus when he denied Him three times? Where was Peter's faith in this darkest hour? Yes...Peter doubted and disappointed God. I imagine that every Christian

> is guilty of doubt and unbelief at some time in their life, too. Just as Peter repented of his doubt and unbelief, we too need to repent of our doubt and unbelief, and give our lives wholly to Christ. It takes courage to believe in

God! I believe the Apostle Paul wrote the book of Hebrews, and in chapter 10 he makes reference to the Israelites when they doubted God and were afraid to enter the Promised Land. "But my righteous one will live by faith. And if he shrinks back, I will not be pleased with him. But we are not of those who shrink back and are destroyed, but of those who believe and are saved." (Hebrews 10:38-39). Like the Israelites, if we want to inherit the promises of God in His Word, we will have to be courageous and live by faith.

Wilnes Lapeine, a 10th grade student, had no idea when he left home on June 6 that he'd be in a motorcycle accident. Wilnes had a broken leg and needed surgery. His mother is deceased and his father is absent. So his pastor, Joseph Freguins, and his wife Carmene Calixte, both teachers in New Missions schools, are his caregivers. They admitted Wilnes to the hospital but had insufficient funds. The mission paid for his surgery and medical bills, and will follow his case until it's closed. BIBLE COLLEGE LEGACY

This month, August 2019, marks the 20th anniversary of our church in Ti-Boucan, Haiti. We have 35 churches across Haiti and the Dominican Republic. The story of Ti-Boucan is a unique one—because of the location of this mountainside church and school.

Doing some research in our archives, I found this segment written by my father, Pastor George DeTellis, about the Ti-Boucan church: "The goats that grace the Haitian mountains have great dexterity. Even so is a young pastor in our Bible College named Joseph Elite Eliane. He is tenacious for the Lord. My first time visiting this mountain church in Ti-Boucan, I was unsure we could reach the top because it was so steep."

Pastor Joseph Elite Eliane finished Bible college at New Missions in the year 2000, and today, we have 156 children attending school in Ti-Boucan, Haiti. As we invest in the lives of new Bible college students, we celebrate their graduation and send-off to serve in churches across Haiti. Matthew 9:37-38 says it best, "Then Jesus said to His disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." ~Tim DeTellis

THE NARROW AND WIDE GATE

There are two different paths and gates described in God's Word. "Enter by the narrow gate; for wide is the gate and broad is the way that leads to destruction, and there are many who go in by it. Because narrow is the gate and difficult is the way which leads to life, and there are few who find it." (Matthew 7:13-14). We first see in life, most people are following popular opinion. Popular opinion tells people to think of themselves first. They are told to do whatever pleases them. This would be an example of the wide gate. People are going with the main flow of the world. They are trying to please themselves, but

really lack values and purpose. They are not thinking eternally, but are only thinking of their current life.

NARROW GATE There is everything at stake with the choices we make. I was really taken aback when I heard this teaching again. The early disciples taught there were two paths: one path leading to life, and one path leading to death. Some people can become complacent in life and just go with the flow of things. God wants us to be our best. He wants us to live our lives with vigor and purpose. He wants us to make every day count.

Jesus is the narrow gate. In John 14:6 Jesus declared, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man comes unto the Father, but by me." He is waiting for us to invite Him into our lives, as there is no other way to become saved. We are saved by grace. It is a gift of God. We come to Christ as we are. Some people believe they are ultimately good people and

so they will inherit good things in the life to come. However, our actions cannot earn us a position in heaven. We have to come under the Lordship of Christ.

Jesus requires us to keep Him first in our lives. We are to follow the commandments and teaching of Christ. We are to live disciplined lives. We are told to be holy, and that our bodies are the temple of the Holy Spirit. God will lead us to do good works, which we would not naturally want to do in our human nature. It is crucial for believers to be in Christian fellowship and in the Word of God in order to be edified and encouraged in our daily Christian walk. "And that he

> is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." (Hebrews 11:6b). "For it is God who works in you both to will and to do for His good pleasure." (Philippians 2:13).

We are to have no fear in this world. In Joshua 1:9 we read, "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go." We should have no fear of what man can do to us.

Let us hold onto the teachings from Romans 8:38-39: "For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor principalities, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." We need to have hope in our eternal position with Christ.

ARE YOU THE GOOD NEIGHBOR?

At the age of eleven, I moved to Haiti and lived in a remote village by the sea. While there, I learned a great deal about the value of community. I remember walking to the shoreline and helping villagers pull in the fishing net. This process was a key source of food for Haitians—and it wasn't possible without community.

No matter where you live, a strong community is essential for life. And yet, togetherness is quickly becoming an endangered idea. We often hide behind our garage doors and spend our time on back patios instead of front porches, away from our neighbors.

How important is being a good neighbor to Jesus? The more I turn the pages of the gospels, the more I see Jesus helping the hungry, the hurting, and the lost. He meets the needs of the human heart—whether He was talking with one

woman at a well, or thousands of people on a hillside. Through these different examples, we see how much Jesus values being a good neighbor.

September 28 is National Good Neighbor Day. Becky Mattson of Lakeside, Montana, created this special day in 1977. And in 1978, then President of the United States, Jimmy Carter, issued Proclamation 4601: "As our nation struggles to build friendship among the peoples of this world, we are mindful that the noblest human concern is concern for others. Understanding, love, and respect build cohesive families and communities. The same bonds cement our nation and the nations of the world. For most of us, this sense of community is nurtured and expressed in our neighborhoods where we give each other an opportunity to share and feel part of a larger

family... I call upon the people of the United States and interested groups and organizations to observe such a day with appropriate ceremonies and activities."

Recently, I was outside walking my dogs Duke and Daisy. Across the street I saw a couple that had just finished visiting the construction site of their brandnew home. They were driving out of their driveway, but they shut off their truck and walked across the street to see my dogs. We had met before and began to talk. Just then, our neighbors Jorge and Marlene came up the street and joined us. Next, our neighbor Jill from

> around the corner drove by. She slowed, and rolled down her window to say hello before continuing on her way. The man who had been visiting his new home said, "I'm going to enjoy living here. You are all such kind neighbors. Why are you so kind

to one another?" Jorge replied, "It's because we're all in a Bible study together."

Consider the words found in Luke 10:29, "But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbor?" Jesus responded to this question by telling the story of the Good Samaritan. A man was left hurt, lonely, and hungry on the side of the road. Two people passed right by the man, but one person stopped to help him—the Good Samaritan. After telling the parable, Jesus asked this question in Luke 10:36-37, "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

CHILDREN'S BIBLE CLUBS

These groups meet every weekend apart from our normally scheduled church services. Many of the children who come to the Bible Club do not go to church regularly, and neither do their parents. This is a wonderful outreach opportunity for us. We are able to share the Gospel through Bible stories on an appropriate age level for them. Despite all these challenges, our Haitian pastors chose Psalm 13:6 as the verse of this school year. "We will sing because the Lord has been good to us." The verse was introduced at the directors meeting we had before the opening of the school year. At this meeting, reports were given of students saved during school chapels and summer events.

This summer, 244 Haitians from New Missions churches went on various mission trips within Haiti. They returned with an extra person because one pregnant mother safely delivered her baby early while out on mission! More than 100 people were saved, and 17 rededicated their lives to the Lord!

Also, three new wells were recently drilled on three more school campuses. New school buildings are being built in Masson, and their church is being extended. A church is being constructed in Flon, and boundary walls are beginning to go up at our Bire campus. God is always working and we will sing because He has been good to us! ~Rachel DeTellis

In Colossians 3:23-24 we read, "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for human masters, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. The sullen servant who does shoddy work will be held responsible. Being a follower of Jesus doesn't cover up bad work.

While driving near Detroit, there was a billboard that read, Fired and Focused. Are you fired and focused? As a Christian, you are fired because of the Holy Spirit working in you—the same spirit that raised Christ from the dead is in you to work. FIRED AND FOCUSED:

Work is a gift from God. Work **WORKING AND HAPPY** is healthy, and work gives us great contentment and satisfaction, and a purpose in living. There are nights I lay awake thinking of what I want to do for work. I get accelerated and energized and I often wish it were morning to begin to work. Work is honorable and Biblical. Are you a child of God? Then, you are like God. And God is always working.

God's work is beyond our capacity to see or know. On a road trip through Canada and Alaska, the beauty of His handiwork was beyond my human praises. But the greatest work God did for me was to give His son to die on the cross for my forgiveness, freedom, and eternity. And now God is still at work with me—firing me to focus on His work. Work is love and work is joy.

We are also encouraged to work, because the night is coming when no man can work. Jesus is working now to return to come and get us. We have an urgent assignment to work.

To be focused, there will be times you will have to say no to some good work, because there is a special call and purpose in your life. Saying no empowers you to do the best work—the call of God. And you can only work with the power of God enabling you to work—that is you in Him, according to John 15:4: "Apart from Me, you can do nothing!"

Have you ever watched someone who loved their work? Gloria, our former Colegio Nueva Vida director in the Dominican Republic, loved her work. At some

> seasons she arrived before daylight, and many nights left after dark. God focused her on the lives of hundreds of students. These students are like her trophies now pastors, preachers, doctors, nurses,

and teachers. Another woman, Sister Ann in Haiti, has been a cook for one of our mission schools for more than 25 years. Her big smile, cooking 10-gallon pots of tasty food, has motivated a multitude of children to come to school and have the nutritional stability to achieve and thrive.

Your works will never be forgotten. Revelation 14:13 tells us that after our death, our works will be remembered. Your work now is recorded for eternity. You can work, because God will give you the strength and grace for the lousy days to keep working until our work is finished. Now is the time to work fired and focused.

Twenty years ago, the chairman of our Board of Directors in Canada had a friend living in Sosúa, in the Dominican Republic. He asked New Missions if we would begin a ministry to the children of Haitian immigrants whose parents came to the DR to cut sugar cane. Our hearts bonded with the people—especially because of our Creole tongue and understanding of the Haitian culture and plight. After much prayer, we agreed to expand New Missions into the DR.

For many years we held school in what you would call a ghetto, as we tried to buy land to provide a new school. Five years ago, we found land, but the cost was \$128,000. The story of the woman who broke the alabaster box at the feet of Jesus became another story about the same in the Dominican Republic. A woman I never knew nor met went to visit the land, saw the children, and paid for most of the entire cost. She broke her heart of love by emptying her resources to let Jesus love the children.

This year, the children are in their brand new school on a campus with trees, mountain views, and a wellestablished Christian ministry.

God bless this woman and all those like her who made this happen for the poorest of the poor.

Many Haitians feel blessed if they own a Bible, and it is unlikely that each family member would have their own. In my home growing up I remember Bibles, Christian magazines, books, and in particular a 10-volume set called "The Bible Story" that contained about 2,000 pages of stories. Undoubtedly, these resources helped to form my understanding of God and His Word.

We are thankful that we were able to give all our preschool through eighth graders a Christian book at the start of the school year. Some of the books are simply for reading and discussing—like "Pilgrim's Progress." Some are Bible stories, and this year we found a fourth grade Bible curriculum covering the giving of the law in the Old Testament. Our Bord-Mer fourth grade teacher, Samuel Saint Louis, says that he appreciates using the curriculum because it is well written and it's helpful having the pictures to show the students while teaching the material. "The Lord said to me, 'You have seen correctly, for I am watching to see that my word is fulfilled." Jeremiah 1:12

I left my house at 4:30 a.m. to catch a 6:00 a.m. flight to JFK International Airport. Without any luggage, I picked up my rental car, and drove over an hour to Avenel, New Jersey. I arrived just in time for the Saturday morning check-in at the New Jersey Dept. of Corrections. I was not allowed to bring anything into the facility, not even a handkerchief. Traveling through long hallways and multiple gates and security checkpoints,

I was seated in a plastic stack chair in the middle of a basketball gymnasium. Watching the clock on the wall, my longtime friend of over 30 years entered in his prison uniform just after 9:00 a.m. I planned for this day for over a year. My 76-year-old friend was sentenced to 18 years for his crimes. Short of a miracle,

he will spend the rest of his life in prison. I love him. Jesus still loves him, too. We hugged and spent two precious hours talking about the Lord. He is a broken man and repentant for his sins. He was a minister and preacher of the Gospel. But he was not exempt from the Word of God. Growing up as a young boy I remember my grandmother always quoting the Scripture "...be sure your sin will find you out." (Numbers 32:23) Every day, the headlines in the news tell a story of someone who thought they could keep a secret. God's Word is alive and active. What Scripture in the Bible do you want God to perform in your life? I hope it's not "...be sure your sin will find you out."

The Scriptures that we want God to perform in our lives are His promises of blessings. Blessings come from obedience. As a child will hold his father to his promises, we can hold God to His promises.

I believe that praying Scripture is powerful. We are holding God to His word. We are confessing our will with His will. "...so is my word that goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for

> which I sent it." (Isaiah 55:11) When I spent three nights in a hospital after a heart attack, I prayed Romans 8:11 over and over: "And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of his Spirit who lives

in you." I was claiming the Word of God as a promise over my life. When we pray the Word of God, we are not using our words, but His words. We know that God holds His Word above His name. "...for you have so exalted your solemn decree that it surpasses your fame." (Psalm 138:2) God uses His Word to accomplish His will in our lives. The more you read the Bible and fill your mind with His Word, His promises will be fulfilled in your life. God has a great vision for you. But it will only be realized if you devote yourself to reading His Word and obeying His commandments.

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FOOD IN CRISIS

When Haiti has political unrest, the threat to families comes in the form of limiting access to food. Knowing the severity of the situation in Haiti, I found myself asking for prayer from a group of kids at Lifepointe Church in Eustis, Florida. I was there on Wednesday evening sharing about our Shoebox Drive their church participates in annually. I closed our time by asking us all to join the same team—the prayer team for the kids at New Missions.

We will continue to purchase food in Haiti and feed our students.
