THERE'S GOING TO BE A REVIVAL IN THIS LAND

We had a team from Christian Community Fellowship, Houma, Louisiana, visit us to do evangelism and a crusade. The last night of the crusade, there was revival. The platform was full with people accepting the blood of Jesus for their salvation and deliverance. The crowd sang and danced for hours with the dust of the ground filling the air making the tent appear smoke-filled. The music and ministry was shared with the Haitians. On several occasions, a Haitian would sing and an American would interpret or sing along in English. Both Haitians and Americans played pianos, guitars and drums. Christian Community Fellowship came with their music and drama teams. The message of the skits portraying the crucifixion and resurrection and power of Jesus reached the hearts of the people. There is a revival in this land.



GIVE ME YOUR SHIRT

On an early predawn morning, one of our missionaries was walking the oceanfront preparing for a devotional. Along came a Haitian man and said the four most common English words that most poor can say, "Give Me One Dollar." The missionary was frustrated as over and over again, an American is asked for money. In his frustration, the missionary reacted, "Give me your shirt." The Haitian took off his shirt and handed it to the American.

HIGH SCHOOL UPDATE: The roof is on at the high school. The windows are on and the floor tiles will begin going down by the time you receive this newsletter.

We need to immediately begin the construction of a workshop at the high school. This building will be 40 feet wide and 84 feet long. It will house tools to teach trades to our high school students.

The high school site needs to be wired for electricity. From the street pole, the electric line will come into the workshop. The main electrical panel will be housed there and then electricity will go to the other buildings. This building needs to be erected immediately. Electric supplies have been shipped to Haiti from Miami and will reach us soon.

NUTRITIONAL MINISTRY: Kelli Hadley, the Director of our Missions Clinic formed a nutritional ministry for 2-year olders. They come with their mothers and receive a lesson in nutrition and health care. The mother is given high protein foods, grains and milk for the children. The children are monitored from month to month. Kelli was excited this month to report weight gains of at least one pound on every child, except one who had been sick.

VILLAGE OF BIRE

"Carrefour" in Haitian Creole means "cross-roads." It is where two or more roads meet. Bire is such a village. It is the crossroads for the villages of LaSalle and Neply. Every day I go past the village of Bire, often on my way to another village for ministry or to Signeau to oversee the construction of our high school.

Bire is also at spiritual crossroads. Many young people, out of work and not in school, frustrated, hang around the crossroads with nothing to do. Pray for these young men. They are at spiritual crossroads in their lives.

In Bire, we have a school with preschool, kindergarten, first, second, third and fourth grades. Two hundred children now meet in three temporary buildings. Several good missionaries have served there, including Kelly Hadley, Maria Miller, Dean Showalter, Jodi Teller and now Gerald Showalter. There are at least 1000 people in the village of Bire.

We have been ministering in Bire for five years. Two years ago, we purchased a beautiful piece of property. Now thank God, a church and school will be built in Bire. Groundbreaking is taking place March 7th. A building 27 feet by 174 feet will be built, housing a church, two classrooms and a dining room. That same week, a revival crusade will be conducted at the crossroads in Bire.

MISSION NEWS

The High School building is almost complete. There is one more 10-foot window to be installled and six more floors to be laid with tiles. We broke ground on the first workshop for the Trade School on February 12th.

TESTIMONY OF YVON ST. VICTOR

MARIE YOLEINE - A CHANGED TEENAGER

Marie Yoleine is from the village of Bire, where she was known to often have fits. She would run, scream and tear off hear clothes often falling and hurting herself.

When our high school opened this past fall, Marie Yoleine came to me asking permission to be enrolled in our new school. Some folks said "No. Don't take her in. She'll have a bad influence on the other students and ruin the school." At this time, Marie Yoleine admitted to serving Satan. I thought and prayed and finally said, "I'm not giving this girl to the devil." Marie Yoleine was enrolled in the first year of high school.

By having God's word taught and preached at the school and due to the witness of the other Haitian christian young people, Marie Yoleine accepted the Lord. Now Marie does not belong to the devil-she belongs to Jesus.

Recently, I attended a chapel service at the high school and Marie Yoleine was singing a song. Her face beamed as she sang of deliverance by the blood of Jesus. Thank you Lord!

MY CALL TO HAITI

Six years ago, a professor from Eastern College came to Come Alive New Testament Church in Medford, New Jersey and spoke to us about his work in Haiti. As he spoke, the Lord touched my heart regarding this far-off land and I made a committment to spend a year of my life on the mission field of Haiti.

In the Fall of 1987, Pastor George and Jeanne DeTellis of NEW Missions visited our church and poured out their hearts regarding the work God had called them to do in Bord Mer, Haiti. As they spoke, the Lord confirmed in my heart that this was where I would serve.

It wasn't until November of 1989 that I actually first set foot on Haitian soil. I had gone with a group to visit NEW Missions for one week. I was encouraged by the work of NEW Missions and impressed by how much had been accomplished in such a short period of time by Pastor George and Jeanne. That the Lord had blessed and given permanence to the work of their hands was obvious. Their gentle spirit, and the love of the Haitian people won the hearts of our entire group. At this writing, I've been at NEW Missions for several weeks. The time has passed very quickly, and the new friends I have made are a special blessing. The fellowship is fantastic, the weather unbelievable, and the love of the Haitian children most rewarding. I feel the Lord has placed me at NEW Missions because here even one extra person can make a significant contribution to the Kingdom of God.

BIRE: Last month we had a groundbreaking service, the first five shovels of soil being removed in memory of the 5 missionaries who served in Haiti. Last week Gerald Showalter dug out the foundation getting ready for the gravel fill. The Christians in Bire are encouraged as they have been meeting in a thatch building for five years.

HIGH SCHOOL: Fourteen thousand courtyard cement patio blocks were purchased and landscaping will begin soon. The cement foundation for the vocational workshop has been poured and the masons have begun laying concrete blocks.

TIBRACHE CHURCH: A week of revival was held during the height of the political upheaval at the Ti Brache church. Although a thatch was erected twice the size of the original church, there was not sufficient room in the building all week. Pray with us for land for a permanent church building in Ti Brache.

HAITI IN THE THROWS

President Prosper Avril was forced to leave the country on March 10, 1990. The reigns of government have been passed on to an interim government headed up by Madame Ertha P. Trouillot. There is a spirit of euphoria on the part of the Haitian people because of their successful revolt. They feel that power is now in their hands.

Ever since Jean Claude Duvalier left the country, there has been an increase of robberies here in Haiti; especially in the city of Port Au Prince. The tonton macoutes generally have been blamed for the increase in theft. It is the macoutes who were the private police of Duvalier. Guns still remain in the hands of many of them. There is a determined effort to seek out these macoutes and either have them arrested or killed.

We at the mission are fortunate to live isolated from the political and civil strife going on in the country. With us, it is work as usual. Another building is under construction. School is functioning and special Gospel meetings are being held in several of our NEW Mission Churches. It is amazing how, in the midst of chaos, God gives us peace and rest.

The Kingdom does not always come with peace. There is conflict in the world. Nehemiah built the walls of Jerusalem and the temple with one hand on a trowel and the other hand holding a sword. Joshua entered the promised land only to fight giants and confront armed cities. One of the pictures of the Christian believer is one with sword and shield.

Yes, we no longer fight a natural warfare. Our weapons are not carnel. They are spiritual, yet they are still weapons and we are in mortal combat. We are never to lay our weapons down while in this present world. We are promised that when we rely on the Lord that we will have the victory; for the battle is the Lord's. Fight on oh Christian Soldier!

THE STORY OF BORLANCE

Borlance is a hidden village at the end of the Leogane Plain where the mountains dip into the ocean. It is one of those virgin Carribean spots that you would find in the latest National Geographic Magazine. When we visited Borlance, we found naked little boys playing in wooden hand-dug out canoes. The village is an isolated oceanfront community hardly in touch with modern civilization.

There was a young boy who was attending NEW Missions school in Bord Mer at the mission base. This boy was living with relatives in our area to attend our school. Later, he moved back to Borlance to be with his mother. There this boy met a young preacher, Kenson Dort, and told Kenson about Pastor George and NEW Missions.

One day, Kenson Dort, the young Haitian preacher came to NEW Missions. Although we have had many preachers, from other areas of Haiti, come to ask for NEW Missions to help them, we have always felt God calling us to do a special work on the Leogane Plain. Since Borlance was one of those villages on the Leogane Plain, we were open to begin to work with the preacher and the people of Borlance.

The children of Borlance will be photographed, and this fall NEW Missions will have a school and church there in the village. The school will meet in temporary thatch buildings until such time that we are able to purchase property and put up a permanent building.

There are at least 10 other villages along the coast of the Leogane Plain that do not have a school or church. God helping us, the day will come when we will reach out to minister to all of these unreached villages.

MISSION NEWS

HIGH SCHOOL CLASS DAY: On April 17th, we took 54 of our high school students on a field trip to the town of Les Cayes. This town is located across the peninsula on the Carribean side of Haiti. While we were there, we visited the American University in Les Cayes. The dean of the school showed us around the beautiful building they have put up and talked to our students about entrance requirements. Our young people were encouraged to learn that the possibility of a higher education would be available to them.

HIGH SCHOOL SITE: A building to house trade school shops is under construction at the high school in Signeau, Haiti. In this building we will begin teaching trades to the young people of our high school. The building is 40 feet wide and 84 feet long and is the first of two workshops planned for construction. The walls of the building are completed and the roof will begin to go on by the end of this month.

MISSIONARY NEWS

GEORGE AND ANNETTE GOSSELIN, BILL AND LIL JOHNSON, JANICE SWINTON AND BLAIR WAGNER, have finished their short term of service in Haiti. We are grateful for their ministries. They have worked faithful and hard serving the Lord at NEW Missions. We pray that we will see them back for another term of service in the future.

NANCY TUCCERO: Nancy will return to Haiti on May 15th for several months. Nancy is a member of Christian Assembly located in Boston, Massachusetts. Nancy is a wonderful worker and a help to our mission. One of her special ministries is working with the young women in our sewing class. This will be Nancy's 8th trip to Haiti. She has shown herself to be fearless in the face of many political and spiritual adversities in Haiti.



TONY DORVAL: Tony is the missionary to the villages TiRiviere and Leogane. He has also done accounting work at the mission. Tony's term of service will be over in July. At that time he will have spent 15 months at Missions. Tony has NEW served the Lord well. love him and pray that he will return to work with us for a longer period of time. Tony comes to us from Latter Rain Christian Fellowship in Ashland, Massachusetts.

There was a sweet, but strong move of God's presence. The Birey church was overcrowded even after borrowing all the benches from a school classroom. Many women sat on the ground outside the church eager to hear the Word of God. This women's ministry will meet every Wednesday afternoon.

POLITICAL UPDATE - We are thankful for the political stability that we are experiencing in the country. Elections are scheduled in the fall. Please continue to pray for Haiti.

EIGHT LITERACY SCHOOLS

For those of us who were born and educated in a country, such as America, we can not imagine the pain of never having the opportunity to learn to read or write. Illiterate people are often subject to exploitation.

In Haiti, about 80 percent of the people do not have a formal education. In our area, all of the children are in mission schools. Many of the parents of these children have expressed a deep desire to learn to read. "When we are in church, we cannot read the songs or the Bible...please help us."

NEW Missions has 8 literacy schools with 200 adults enrolled. One day while visiting our construction site in Birey, the literacy class had just finished. The adults came to us to ask, "Please may our class continue through the summer. We are now beginning to read and write and want to continue." Of course we granted permission. These literacy classes are a wonderful way to make friends with the Haitian people and to introduce them to Jesus Christ.

PAULA JEAN SCHAEFER - Paula has finished her year of missionary service at NEW Missions. Paula is a young lady who is an efficient hard worker. Her labors for the mission were invaluable. Dear Friends of Haiti,

HEALTHIER HEAVIER AND HAPPIER BABIES IN HAITI

In the United States, prenatal care during pregnancy is readily available. Most women know the importance of caring for themselves during pregnancy. A healthy newborn is worth the time and effort it takes to care for your body during pregnancy.

In Haiti, a lack of medical personnel and finances prevents most women from receiving prenatal care. The poor nutritional status of the pregnant women and hard work lead to low birth weights and high maternal fatalities. Most children in Haiti begin life malnourished and underweight.

NEW Missions began prenatal care to the women of our area in 1985 under the direction of our nurse, Kelli Hadley. A tremendous change can now be seen in the health of the children. The newborns are having normal birth weights and are more alert and responsive. There are 120 women enrolled in the prenatal program which is seperated into 4 classes. Each week the women receive vitamins and a medical examination. Any problems or abnormalities are referred to our Haitian doctors, Dr. Francois or Dr. Michelle.

The newborns at NEW Missions on the Leogane Plain in Haiti are born heavier, healthier and happier. It is a blessing to see these 'little ones' get a good start in life. NEW Missions has broken the high mortality rate for infants on the Leogane Plain.

SUMMER MISSIONARIES

Jeffrey Lee from San Diego, California is a young man, 22 years old. Jeff is efficient, hard working with a lovable cheerful personality. He will be with us for two months and is assisting in the clinic. Jeff will return to school in the fall with plans to become a medical doctor.

Terri Lerch from Baltimore, Maryland. Terri is a 2nd grade school teacher. She will be with us for one month and is assisting setting up the school programs, classes, books and uniforms for the fall.

GROWTH

The growth of NEW Missions continues to amaze us. We are being born along by the Holy Spirit. He is the Master Designer and alone knows where we are going.

This fall we will have over 3000 children enrolled in our school program. This includes children from preschool through the third year of high school.

Along with the growth in the number of children are the number of people employed at the mission. We now have 83 teachers, 38 people employed in the school kitchen and at the Missions Training Center, 7 night security guards and 38 men working on construction for a total of 166 people. NEW Missions is now one of the largest employers on the Leogane Plain. Our presence is a big help to the local economy.

HIGH SCHOOL - The high school building is being painted. The outside is finished and the men are working on the inside. Floor tiles are still being laid in the classrooms and bricks are being laid in the courtyard.

BIREY - The concrete slab for the building has been poured. We used 300 sacks of cement to pour the floor. The building is 27 feet wide and 172 feet long. By the time you receive this newsletter blocks will be going up to build the walls.

CHURCH REVIVALS THROUGHOUT THE SUMMER

The church in Birey began Revival Meetings for one week beginning July 22nd. The church in Bord Mer is having Revival Meetings for two weeks beginning July 29th-August 12th. The church in Signeau finished Revival Meetings July 22nd.

HAITIAN YOUTH BRING THE GOSPEL TO THE MOUNTAINS

The youth of the churches went on a preaching mission this month and brought back reports of the hospitality of the mountain people and their reception of the Gospel. The youth were equipped with full-color Creole tracts and Gospel booklets. They came back glowing with exciting reports of people coming to faith in Christ.

THIS LIFE WILL PASS

One evening as the sun was setting, I walked to the school and sat outside the "chacoon" (a round type open-porch building). Chatting with a few high school students. As we talked, they began expressing their frustration living in a poor country. "We are suffering. There is nothing we can do. Our life is no better than the animals. Our hope is that this life will pass and we will go to be with Jesus."

For me these were very hard words. I have always lived in the belief that good things were happening and my outlook for the future has always been bright and positive. But then I have never really been poor.

Believe me, after living with the poorest people in the western hemisphere, I have learned that there is nothing glamorous about being poor. The poor feel trapped. They do not have the choice of food, housing, travel, education or employment. They feel locked in and helpless.

The Gospel has 'lift'. When people come to personal faith in Jesus, their lives will be changed. God is a God of blessing. Israel was promised full barns and victory over her enemies in return for serving the Lord. We are spiritual Israel. God wants the Gospel to be preached in all the world and for all the nations, Haiti too, to be blessed. Psalm 67.

The word of God says that the poor shall have the Gospel preached unto them. We need to preach and believe that those nations that make the Lord their God will be blessed.

We have the promise of heaven. We also have the promise of our God working in the present, changing, improving and lifting our lives.

We labor in the knowledge that God has sent us and in the belief that His Word can change the world. We ask for your prayers. We love you and thank God for you.

MISSION NEWS

REVE - 'Reve' in Creole is revival. When the chuches have special meetings for a week or more, they call them 'reve'. These have taken place in one church after another throughout the warm summer in Haiti. The churches have been packed, especially with young people. The prayer life and enthusiasm of these young Christians gladdens our heart. God is at work changing lives and changing Haiti.

BIREY CHURCH AND SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

The hardest part of constructing any building is preparing the site and pouring the concrete slab that the building sits on. It seemed to take forever to get the building in Birey started. Now the blocks are laid and the construction is going very fast. The men finished laying the blocks the end of August. The building is being skim-coated and then the doors and roof will go on. Our goal is to have the building completed by the first week in October.

MISSIONARY NEWS

NANCY TUCCERO - Nancy finished a 3-month term of ministry supervising sewing projects, assisting in village ministries and child-sponsor letterwork. She loved us all and worked very hard.

MARY JANE BASEL - Mary Jane Basel returned to Haiti on August 3rd after a furlough. She is again busy directing the primary schools.

MICHELLE WRIGHT - Michelle is from the Resurrection Life Church in Rome, New York. Michelle is with us in Haiti for 3 months, assisting in village and office ministries.

MISSION AVIATION FELLOWSHIP - MAF will no longer be providing mail service after the month of September. Letters for missionaries may be sent to the Worcester (US) office, but we cannot handle packages at this time.

THE CHILDREN OF HAITI

SCHOOL SPIRIT - The excitement of school this year is at an all-time high! The children of Haiti are desperate to get an education. (More than half of the children in Haiti are still not in school.) This summer we have had children from throughout Haiti come to us. We thank God for the good Christian education we can give to these children.

MISSION NEWS

SCHOOL FOOD - Thank you for your prayers! Already, 12 tons of bulgar, a wheat-grain product, is in our storage facility (depot). Two containers, one 40-foot container and one 20-foot, full of food, are being assembled in the states for shipment to our mission in Haiti. We hope to receive delivery of these containers within the next month. The favorite food of the Haitian people is rice and we are buying rice at the local marketplace here in Haiti.

SCHOOL KITCHEN - Our school kitchen facilities are being remodeled. We are planning for a more efficient use of propane gas by enclosing our gas burners within a concrete table.

BIREY - The roof of the Birey school and church will be up by the time you receive this newsletter. The building project has blessed the local people of Birey with employment. Fifteen people have been employed full-time on this project - two of these have been women carrying water.

MISSIONARY NEWS

We are thankful for the missionaries $\operatorname{\mathsf{God}}$ has sent to us this year.

Bob and Joann West are from the Rock Church in Baltimore, Maryland. They have a long history in the field of education. Bob is the Principal of our High School and his wife Joann is being trained to be the Principal of our primary schools. One of Bob's ministries to the mission team is leading our early morning devotional.

Ed & Marty Neas come from the Wellesley Baptist
Church in Wellesley, Massachusettes. Ed has been
overseeing construction and repairing some of our
equipment. Martie is being trained to direct our clinic
ministry. Their two daughters, Sarah and Rebecca are
homeschooling in the morning and in the afternoons are busy
working in the mission office, writing child-sponsor
letters and overseeing a sewing project.

These new missionaries are also studying and learning the Creole language. They have put in long hard days since their arrival on September 11th. God bless their families and friends who sent them to us.

BEGGAR! COME BACK AND BLESS ME!

Three beggars in rags, barefoot, and one of them blind, were leaving our mission kitchen after having their sacks filled with food. One of our missionaries called back, "Hey. Come back and bless me. Maybe you are an angel of the Lord."

MISSION SCHOOL NEWS

BIBLE SCHOOL - Our Bible School opened this year with 3 courses. Pastoral Theology, Bible Doctrine, and Church History.

HIGH SCHOOL - Our High School building is completely finished! We are awaiting the release of new school chairs which are now in customs. This year we have the first 3 years of high school and we plan to add a grade each year. In Haiti, there are 7 years of high school. Our high school attendance is 160 students.

PRIMARY STUDENTS - We have a primary school in the following 12 villages with a total attendance of almost 3000 children:

TI RIVIERE, FLONC, BRACHE, SIGNEAU, LEOGANE, BORLANCE

LOVE NEVER FAILS



REUNION OF HAITIAN PASTORS

The first Sunday of each month the Pastors from all of the NEW Missions churches come together after church and have a dinner together. Following the dinner, there is a time of giving reports and sharing fellowship. This month the great discussion was centered on the planning of the first convention of the NEW Mission churches. There was much excitement as the voices were telling Pastor George, "They'll be thousands...we need to plan for thousands...a theme...a banner across the highway..." The dates of our first all-church convention will be January 25, 26 and 27, 1991. We are feeling that something spiritually explosive is about to happen in Haiti!

GUY FONTAINE - A FAITHFUL STEWARD

For more than 7 years, Guy Fontaine, a Haitian young man from Port-Au-Prince, has been coming to serve the Lord at NEW Missions. When he first came to us, Guy was a timid Sunday School teacher. Year after year, Guy has gained in statue and anointing. Guy has been the preacher at the Bord Mer church for 5 years; he also has been one of our school teachers. This year he has received a raise in position and is now Assistant to the President of NEW Missions. Guy is close to Pastor George and he is helping in our business affairs in the city.



A TEAM OF NATIONAL PASTORS

NEW Missions is working to train the Haitians to preach, teach and to administer the development of their people and country. We have a team of national pastors who are serving our churches. At the present time, only one of these Pastors, Enold Joseph in Leogane, is sponsored by an American church. We would like to match more American churches with our Haitian churches in prayer and financial support. For \$50. per month your church can sponsor a Haitian Pastor. If you are interested in participating in this ministry, contact our office.

TRANSPORTING SCHOOL FOOD

For many years, a missionary drove a 4-wheel motorcycle to the village of Ti Riviere, bringing the daily school food to the hundreds of school children. This year a Haitian man from the village comes on a small wooden sailboat. Each day the boatman sets his sail and arrives at the mission waterfront by 9:30 am. There he is met by our workers who load the four 10-gallon containers of food on to his boat. The boatman then sails back to the village of Ti Riviere to feed the waiting school children.

MISSION NEWS

BIBLE SCHOOL - The numbers in the Bible School have been encouraging this year. There are 16 - 18 in each class. We thank God for the enthusiasm and the seriousness of the students who are studying the Word.

MADAME MACOUTE - The wife of one of the former Duvalierist private policeman came to hide in a nearby village. She asked for her children to be registered in our schools. The woman was in tears as she described her life of hiding and how she lost her home and her possessions because of political associations. This Madame Macoute has been faithfully attending the women's village ministries. At the last meeting, she expressed how she would love to have a Bible.

PIG PROJECT - A successful pig project has continued at the mission for four years. A pig is given to a Haitian to care for and when there is a litter of piglets, half of the litter is returned to the mission to be given out to other Haitians. Amiro, one of our workers for 7 years, has had several litters. This week Amiro's mother pig gave birth to 10 piglets.

MISSIONARY NEWS

DEE DEE RASMUSSEN - Dee Dee has served NEW Missions for the past 6 weeks. Dee Dee worked with Kelli Hadley administering the Missions Training Center kitchen and also assisted in office projects. We love Dee Dee and we thank God that she will return to us in February for a year of service. Dee Dee is now 17 years old. She first visited the mission 5 years ago as a young girl. Dee Dee is from California.

MICHELLE WRIGHT - Michelle (Mickey) finished serving NEW Missions for a 3-month term of service. Mickey organized several office ministries and cared for the gift-giving in all the schools. Mickey also set up the school kitchen and supervised the school feedings. Her gifts are many and we thank God for her time with us. Mickey is from New York.

FIRE BURN...BURN!

Mary Jane Basel, one of our missionaries, went to a prayer and fasting meeting at her little village of Ti Brache. As the meeting was coming to a close, an old lady came in and wanted to accept Jesus as Savior. She was well known to those there and they knew the woman had many objects of voodoo. The woman accepted the Lord and the people of the church encouraged her to go and get her voodoo objects. On the dirt road was piled bottles, wooden sticks and bowls. A fire was set and after a short time, it began to die out before the wooden sticks caught fire. Mary Jane prayed hard asking God to show forth His presence that the people might believe in His Name. Just then the fire broke forth with great flames and everything was consumed. The people rejoiced in the presence of the Lord.

There is much work to be done in the Name of our Lord in the country of Haiti. We thank you for your love to see lives set free. Your prayers and support for NEW Missions is appreciated.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS

Elections are scheduled to take place in Haiti on December 16th. The United Nations has sent 400 non-armed security advisers throughout the voting stations in Haiti to provide security to the voting people and observe the political process in the country. The general public have registered (78 percent of the voting population) to vote. The vast majority of the people are anxious to begin the process of establishing democracy in the country. There are still elements of the old Duvalierist regime who would like to disrupt the voting and maintain the present status of confusion in the country. We need to unite in prayer believing that God will provide the nation with a duly elected and capable man of God.


