The beating of voodoo drums often kept us awake nights when we first came to Haiti. Now the beating of drums invites people to come and worship Jesus.

A strong revival has broken out among the people who live across from our mission. This area is called Bord Mer (by the sea).

Every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday nights, as the sun sets, the drums beat to call people to the meeting. The singing starts. Soon they

are clapping, dancing and rejoicing in the Lord. Almost everyone in the village is attending the meetings. Some of our missionaries are fasting and praying for this revival to grow and continue.

NEW Missions is paying the tuition and providing a housing and living allowance for both of these men. The

Lord enabling us, each year, several students from our high school will be sent on for higher

education. We believe that this is a good investment in the Kingdom.



Our three boys, Antoine Charles, Wesley Petit-Homme, and Yvon St. Victor, will be graduating from Caribbean Christ For The Nations in Jamaica this May. They will return to work in our churches in Haiti.

What is Happening in Haiti? People Ask!

The blockade against Haiti is causing severe inflation. Our presence is needed NOW more than ever.

All of our schools are running at full capacity. Food is being prepared and served to all of our school children every day. Extra allotments of uncooked food are given to the children on a regular basis for them to have in their homes.

President Bill Clinton, Haitian President Jean Bertrand Aristide and Robert Malvel, the prime Minister of Haiti met recently. New proposals for a compromise with the military leaders of Haiti will be made. They are talking about a settlement for Christmas.

We as missionaries see this as an attempt to give hope to the people of Haiti. The political and economic problems of Haiti are severe and complex. They will not be resolved by a quick fix. A new generation of God-fearing men and women need to be raised up to lead the nation.

We at the mission have been safe. We are surrounded by people who love us and are thankful for our presence in Haiti. The officers controlling the Army and the police have given word that not a hair of an American is to be touched. We are treated with the utmost courtesy by the police.



Greed and corruption are the order of the day. Yes, there is greed and corruption everywhere, even in America. In Haiti, it is pervasive.

Power brings privilege. Men grasp for it and when

power is gotten, they refuse to let go. Americans, for the most part, seek not only their own good, but also the good of others. Not so in the Haitian society. Once power is gotten, all other dangers and threats to that power must be crushed and silenced.

Haiti, however, is changing. It is being done by

God. The Gospel is being preached. Men and women are believing in Jesus Christ.

Health Update



Haiti has had recent outbreaks of measles in different parts of the country. All of the children 15 years of age and under in our area are being vaccinated at our clinic. Some of our children had been vaccinated already. However, due to poor refrigeration in transportation of the serum, all our children are being vaccinated again.

Two-Way Reconciliation

Reconciliation is both ways. There must be reconciliation of God toward man. And reconciliation of man toward God.

Construction Continues During Embargo

This past summer we purchased two truckloads of lumber from Miami. This lumber was loaded into a 45" container along with other supplies and shipped to Haiti. Due to the economic embargo, we had to get special permission from the U.S. government to ship these supplies to Haiti.

Now, in the midst of the economic embargo, construction continues at the mission. The roof is being raised on the new school building in downtown Leogane. A new church is being built along the ocean at Bord Mer, LaSalle. Praise God! The work of the Lord is continuing.

Haiti Political Update

There is an African expression, "When the elephants fight, the grass gets trampled upon." The Haitian people see the problems of Haiti as the problems of the "big people" yet in the end, the "little people" get hurt.

They are waiting. The Haitians are waiting for some development in the delicate

negotiations between President Aristide and the United Nations. The blockade against Haiti is hurting, severely. The small people of Haiti wonder "Why?"

The cost of everything in the country has sky-rocketed. It has become difficult for the average person to provide food for the family.

When will this nightmare end? Where is the solution? The Haitian poor gather in their churches and pray. It is often their only consolation. Sunday morning, the congregation sang over and over, "He's coming. He's coming. I'll see Him face to face."

Music Lessons

Haitians love music. However, they have not had the opportunity to learn music. Now, we have a music teacher for our Primary Schools and another for our High School. They are teaching theory. Also, we have students taking lessons and learning to play the drums, flute, trumpet, guitar, clarinet and accordion.

Additional students will be chosen to take instrument lessons. I believe, one day, we will have a full orchestra and marching band at the mission.



Bibles

We have begun to give Bibles to our school students. Last week, we gave Bibles to all the students in the upper grades of our primary school. All the students in our High School will be given a Bible. The Bible is vinyl covered and contains the Old and New Testament in Creole. Will you help us provide these Bibles? For each \$5 you contribute, we will be able to put a Bible in the hands of one of our students.

Won't You Be My Neighbor

Mr. Rogers, the television actor in a child's television series sings a song "It's a beautiful day in the neighborhood . . . won't you be my neighbor? Please won't you be my neighbor?"

What is it like to live in a neighborhood where 75 percent of the people live in absolute poverty? Wherever you go to visit, your neighbors tell you how hungry they are. Half of them wake up each day not knowing what they will eat. In my neighborhood there are

very few who eat whenever they are hungry. Some eat once a day. Some of my neighbors eat . . . sometime.

You have been to my neighborhood because you help us feed 3400 school children a good hot meal each day. Because the children eat 'vant plein' (full stomach), many of them do not eat when they go home. This helps the food of the household to stretch to other family members.

Today we gave our neighbors more than 7 tons of

grain and green peas. It was a beautiful day. We prayed with them. Our prayer was, "Lord, make their gardens grow with food in abundance. Let them hold their heads high as Your children. Until that day, Lord, we give thanks for the food we can give."

"Won't you be mine? Won't you be mine? Won't you be my neighbor? Please . . . won't you be my neighbor."

"And who is my neighbor?" Luke 10:29.

Understanding The Law of God

The law was given by Moses (Exodus 20). The law is holy. It is a reflection of the nature of God. The problem with the law lies with man. It

is our human nature. When we want to do good, evil is present. Paul says, "The good I would, I do not. And the evil I would not, I do." (Romans

7:19) Human nature is such that man is morally too weak to keep the law.

Free From The Law

A Christian is a man or woman who has entered into Jesus Christ. The result is freedom from the law. The law was an instrument to bring us to Christ. It is likened to a School Master (Gal. 3:24). Think of a school teacher with many class rules: Do not talk, do not cheat, no gum chewing, all home work must be turned

in at first period, etc. Upon each failure, the child was scolded and a ruler put to her or his hands. Strict conformity to the rules were enforced.

"Is there no way for me to get out of this class?" The children thought. One day, someone from outside made a small hole in the back of the room. "Pst. Come," a voice

called. Some of the children snuck out the hole. They were found in the schoolyard rejoicing. Jesus made the hole and He is the hole. He is the end of the law for righteousness (Romans 10:4). As believers in Jesus we are free from the law.

Above The Law

The moral law of the universe prevails. There are standards to which we must conform. All cannot be subjective. Not everything can be left to interpretation. Some objectivity is necessary. It is not enough to say, "Be good." People need signposts to guide along the way. "Keep off the grass" is easily understood.

The successful, the powerful, the famous or the rich are not above the law. David, when King, thought he could write his own code. Ahab pouted over Naboth's

land and finally took it by force. Jezebel got it for him. "You are the King," she said. His days ended violently with the dogs licking his blood. Prophet, preacher, politician, singer, or entertainer, regardless to what height we might rise, we are not above the law.

As believers, we are governed by the Holy Spirit. Love your neighbor and you will have fulfilled the law. We are a new creation (Gal. 6:15). It is this that the world needs to see. We are not under the law, yet not above the law.

Without Law

Some in life have little or no knowledge of God. Children grow up with a lack of discipline in the home. Families are fragmented. The moors of life are absent. They do what pleases or what seems right in their own eyes. Our society is becoming more violent. Crime abounds. Our jails are full. The general public live in fear. A society where many live without law, without moral guidelines will begin to come apart.

Haiti Political Update

Haiti is at a stalemate. Aristide wants the United Nations to tighten the embargo to hasten his return to Haiti. The Haitian people are tired. They want the embargo to go away. Their concern is for the loss of jobs and the great inflation which has come to the country.

I believe that it is fair to say that the military, the Roman Catholic Church, the Parliament and the upper class

of Haiti do not want to see Aristide return. The missionary community in Haiti has stayed clear of political involvement. However, I do not know of a single missionary who is in favor of the embargo.

At this point in time, it would be most humane if Aristide would resign. Then Haiti could have new elections and get on with developing the country.

Gas Stations Closed

For about six months the gas stations in Haiti have been closed. Somehow the Haitian people adapt to their sufferings. Gas is being brought over the mountains in barrel drums from the Dominican Republic. It is being sold by roadside sellers at \$6.80 US per gallon.



Obedient To The Call

While on a flight between Dallas and California and praying to God for direction in my life, a quiet voice came to me saying: "Go to Haiti - 50 children." It was well over a year later before I got to go to Haiti and I still didn't know what I was supposed to do.

By chance, I met George and Jeanne in an intersection on the main highway in Haiti, May 14, 1987. A man, who was driving our car, recognized them. Our driver asked George and Jeanne if he could bring our group by their mission for dinner on Saturday night. Tired, though we were, we went to NEW Missions.

After dinner, George began talking about a village where an organization failed in a commitment to sponsor a school of fifty seven children. It was the Village of TiRiviere. A chill went down my back. I realized that this was the reason God had sent me to Haiti.

Back at my church in southern California, I shared the project with the Missions Pastor. Weeks went by and nothing happened. I then realized I had not finished God's task. I formed a Haiti committee and began a

sponsorship program at the church. God opened doors and sponsors were found for all fifty-seven children. Today, there are over 250 children at the church school in TiRiviere.

What Is In Your Hand?

What is in your hand? Roland is a young man and father of six children. He works in our school kitchen. At the end of each working day, there are 15 empty gallon oil cans at the kitchen. Roland takes the empty cans to his home where he cuts an oblong side panel of the tin. He then curves the pieces of tin and with a nail and hammer, makes a nail hole one by one close together. He makes what we call in more developed

countries a 'grater.'

These tin graters are used all over Haiti as a kitchen tool. The Haitian women take coconut meat and grate it. Then they add water to it and squeeze the coconut to get a coconut milk oil base for their cooking. Each day that the children have rice and beans, you will see our kitchen men and ladies grating dozens of coconuts to add to the food, adding nutritious protein and

flavor to the childrens' food.

Roland is a serious young man who was led to the Lord by visiting Americans several years ago. Since accepting Christ, he has been employed by NEW Missions. He was living in a mud hut but now has a cement block house. His roof is half finished. Selling these graters has helped Roland. What is in your hand? Use it to be a blessing and be blessed.



Haiti Political Update

The political scene has not changed. When the Haitian women cook, they use a large spoon to stir the food over the hot fire. It seems to us that what is being said in the media regarding Haiti is nothing but stirring the political pot.

The concensus of opinion is that things will

remain pretty much the same until President Aristide's 5-year term runs out; which will be 20 months from now.

The best news is what is happening spiritually in Haiti. Our churches are doing well. Revival meetings are being held nightly. People are getting saved. The believers

are learning, more now than ever, that our help comes from the lord.

This present situation, in time, will change. Haiti will go on, we believe, to become a better, stronger country. The people are coming to know that God alone is their Deliverer.

Graduation News

In August 1992, we sent three young Haitian men to Jamaica. They attended Caribbean Christ For The Nations.

Now, two years later, they will be graduating. Wesly Petit-Homme, Yvon St. Victor and Antoine Charles will graduate

on May 21st. All three of these young men are sponsored by Pastors in the U.S., Pastor Harry Thomas, Pastor Ron Hoffman, and Pastor Franklin Hobbs.

These three young men will return to Haiti on May 23rd. Here they will begin working in our churches and Bible School. We expect them to be a mighty force in our work here in Haiti.

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School Growth and Changes


The schools at NEW Missions have always run double session. This was due to the large number of children in our schools and our lack of facilities. The morning session ran from 7:30 a.m. to 12 noon. The afternoon session was from 12 noon to 4:30 p.m. Different teachers taught each session.

Next school year, the mission will go to a single session. This will provide for better order and give more time for class instruction. We are excited about this. Although, it means a lot of work to go to one session.

Additional school benches will have to be made.

A new school building will be constructed at the main school at Bord Mer. That building will be started immediately. We expect it will be completed for the opening of school in the fall. Other buildings, in time, will be constructed in some of our outlying schools.

Beginning this month an additional 400 children will be registered for Kindergarten.

Bible School

We are having a good year in our Bible School. Our enrollment was 33 students. We offered eleven courses. We expect the enrollment to more than double this fall. Twenty-one courses will be offered. George Ferrar is directing our Bible School. He is a graduate of Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary in Massachusetts.

Our Bible School has a double emphasis. The first is Biblical subjects with the intent of preparing men for the

ministry. The other emphasis is education. Bible is taught in all our schools. Our teachers need training in Bible and education. Most of our pastors are also teachers.

This year I taught a course on World Religions and my wife Jeanne taught Community Development. We consider the training of Haitians one of our prime priorities.

Worship elevates man into God's presence.



Joseph Sungan Kim is coming to Haiti on June 6th for two months. Joseph is from the Canaan Presbyterian Church in Urbana, Illinois.



President Bill Clinton has issued an executive order. As of midnight, June 24th, all commercial airline flights leaving the United States for Haiti will be suspended. International banking transactions will be limited to \$50.

The factories are closed. There are no jobs.

The airport generates money for the country. Thousands of Haitians from the United States come to visit every week. They come with

gifts for their families. Each visitor pays an exit tax. The porters and taxi drivers earn needed money. The airport is a busy place. Now the last crumbs that remain will be taken away.

Reasonable men need to prevail. Those representing this government in Haiti should step down and allow a temporary United Nations security force to come in and regulate things until another government can be put in place.

At our mission everything is going on as usual. The schools are full of excited students preparing for final exams. The office is busy. The clinic is crowded. If it were not for the news, we wouldn't know that anything was happening.

The biggest effect of the embargo is the increase of the cost of goods. The price of everything has gone skyhigh. We would like to believe that we have seen the worst and that things in Haiti will begin to improve.

BIBLE SCHOOL & COLLEGE

We are believing God! For several years we have had a training school for the pastors serving our churches. This fall we will have a training school for our teachers. New Missions has over 100 elementary and high school teachers. We would like to call our school "L'Ecole Royal D'Haiti" (The Royal School of

Haiti). Eventually, we want to have a secretarial school and a school of business administration.

We only charge \$5 in Haitian money each trimester for our students to attend. This is a token payment. The students from our high school need a college-level school to attend to prepare them for life's

work. One of the best investments you will ever make is in the lives of Christian men and women. Will you help our scholarship fund? Make it possible to educate a Christian Haitian young person. This is an investment in people, in the country of Haiti, and in the Kingdom of God.

What are we? We are not grasshoppers. We are mighty men of valor.



The media has been full of news about Haiti. Much of it misrepresents what is truly going on in the country. Most of it does not reflect a true image of who the Haitian people are.

The only commercial flights in and out of Haiti are with Air France. To get to the United States one must go by way of one of the local countries, such as the Dominican Republic.

For us, an intervention and resulting occupation seems


impossible. There are no democratic institutions in Haiti. The infrastructure is broken down. There is a small middle class and no pluralism to speak of. Without these ingredients democracy is not possible. Many years would be needed to develop these ingredients; they could come about only under ideal situations.

The forces that control Haiti are the elite families, the business community, and the military. These forces need to see that a new day needs to

dawn in Haiti. With the support and leadership of these factions, democracy can be realized. It is a situation where leadership must come from the top and not the bottom.

I do not believe that it will ever be tolerated that the (malare) poor of Haiti will unite and wrench the control from the existing power parties. Haiti requires that benevolent, reasonable, intelligent men will share their power with the poor. It will never be taken from them. We must appeal to their basic goodness.

For me, man is equally basically evil and basically good. We are a mixture of good and evil. As Christians we resist evil and yield to the good. This attitude must prevail in Haiti. Let us not pit the classes against each other. Rather, let us call upon the goodness found in all men to work together to build a more just, equitable society to the benefit of all.

OVER THE WEEKEND

Early one Saturday morning a young girl came to our gate. Her sister was suffering a miscarriage. A midwife in the village was willing to care for her. However, the midwife said to me, "I'll care for her body, but

you must give her food. She's hungry."

I went to our mission kitchen and picked up some of the nice foods that visitors had brought us. I found a can of turkey, a ham, soups, cereal,

spaghetti, peanut butter, and kool-aid. When I was through packing the basket, there were 17 attractive items. This food had been brought in by loving Americans who came to visit us in Haiti with loaded suitcases.

A WAYWARD COW

A teen age boy, Jean Claude, came to talk with me. His cow had gotten into a farmer's garden. Now the farmer was holding his cow until Jean Claude paid a fine of \$5.

Jean Claude found me at the clinic. He was upset, for he had no means of getting \$5. We do not usually help boys with their wayward cow problems. However, after saying "No," I felt his desperate despair as he started walking down the road.

"Jean Claude," I cried, "Come back." I knew Jean Claude was good at weaving coconut fans, and I needed some to provide privacy at the back of our home. "Would you like a job," I asked. Jean Claude worked hard and then ate lunch with us. I paid him \$15 for the fans. Now he had \$5 for his cow and \$10 for his pocket.

A Scream Of An Earache

Judy Petit-homme, a 7-year old girl, was screaming as the doctor checked her ears. Judy had an earache. Often in Haiti people use chicken feathers or a hairpin to clean their ears. Ear infections are common. The doctor prescribed ear drops, but our pharmacy had none. However, a visiting American had brought prescription ear drops with her, and Judy was blessed to receive them.

A SPECIAL DAY OF PRAYER

We are asking our friends to unite with us in a special day of prayer for Haiti. On Sunday, August 7, all of our churches in Haiti will gather for a day of fasting and prayer.

It would be wonderful to know that many in the United States will be praying at the same time. We will gather in our churches at 6:00 p.m. Daylight Savings Time and pray until 8:00 p.m. Perhaps you can gather believers together in your church or in your home for a special time of prayer.

Please pray for:

1. The establishment of a good government in Haiti.
2. The people of Haiti who are hungry and hurting.
3. The safety of the missionaries.
4. The effectiveness of the ministry of our pastors, teachers, and medical team.

CONSTRUCTION AT BORDMER: During the recent political problems, our mission has functioned normally. We have been under construction. Five classrooms are well under way at our school at Bordmer. All that remains is for the roof to be put on the building.

WOMEN'S MINISTRY: Our last area women's meeting

was attended by close to 400 women. They walked from villages five miles around. Among the women attending was one of the local voodoo priest's wives.

A fisherman's wife, Benissia, accepted the Lord. Her husband had been waiting for her to come to Christ for two years. As soon as the speaker finished, Benissia came forward and knelt down, even before the invitation for salvation was given.

CLINIC MINISTRY: The clinic ministry has been growing, more and more

people are coming from further away. The clinic had an opening in an administrative position. We are happy to announce that one of our own boys, Jonas Bertrand, is now filling that position.

At our first clinic staff meeting, Jonas opened by saying, "I am happy that finally I can work at the mission. Without New Missions, I would not be prepared for this work because I would not have been educated." Before New Missions came to Haiti, Jonas was working as a domestic in the city of Port-Au-Prince. He said that without the mission he would probably be washing cars. Jonas is being well received by the clinic staff and patients.

MISSIONARY NEWS



JOSEPH KIM, from Canaan Presbyterian Church, Chicago, Illinois, came to Haiti on June 6th. He

has worked in construction and in the clinic. He has given guitar lessons to some of our Haitian young people. We pray for more people like Joseph to come to Haiti.

OLD MAN ANDRE

"Madame George, I have problems. Give me some food," cried old man Andre. Andre lives in a cluster of thatch houses next to our clinic. He has a large tumor in the groin and one eye that protrudes and is glassed over.

Often Andre would come to the mission looking for something. This day he found me sitting by the receptionist

window at our clinic. Many times we have witnessed to him. Again this day I shared the Lord Jesus with him. "Andre, I'm afraid you will die without knowing God. Will you accept Jesus as your Saviour," I asked. Andre surprisingly agreed. He prayed with our Haitian pastor. After 11 years old man Andre has accepted the Lord.

WHAT ARE YOU?

God expresses Himself through His creation and His creatures. "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the firmament shows His handiwork." Psalm 19:1 God is at work in the world.

The Scriptures tell us that we are His ambassadors. The ministry of reconciliation has been passed on to us. We are the light of the world. We are the body of Christ.

In what way does God especially work through you? Are you the eye of God? Reporters have been called the eye of God. They do not, call to action, but rather report to the world what they see. Without them, much evil and injustice would go unknown. Today with the video camera, they are the instant eye to

report to the world.

"Hear the Word of the Lord," Old Testament prophets proclaimed. New Testament preachers are the oracle, the voice of God.

We are sent forth in the world to set in order, repair, and build. When I first saw the bridge spanning San Francisco Bay, I said, "Only God could have built this." At New Missions, 37 buildings have gone up, built by the hand of God. Some consider McArthur

in the Pacific and Eisenhower in Europe to have been the hand of God. Are you His hand?

Some, no doubt, are His mind. Individuals given to serious thought, to again, in each generation interpret the Scriptures so that the message of God can be proclaimed to each succeeding generation. We call them theologians.

Others are the heart of God. God is love, and His love is to be expressed to all. God is looking for men and women willing to be his heart.

Each of us have our place in the body of Christ. God is alive in the world. Paul said, "For me to live is Christ." God works through His people to make Himself known.

Two months have gone by since American airplanes were refused the right to fly in or out of Haiti. That date was June 24th. It is amazing that Haiti has survived. Because of the embargo, the infrastructure in the country has been destroyed. The institutions have deteriorated to almost nothing. Still, the will of the people is alive.

The Haitian people are survivors. They know how to suffer. They are determined to

make it through this tribulation period.

The one thing Haitians are united upon is their opposition to foreign occupancy. They were ruled by France until they drove them out in 1804. Haiti then became the first free black republic. They pride themselves in being free. No one in Haiti wants to see an American invasion and occupation.

Haiti should be left alone. Their problems are internal. I do not believe an outside force will be able to impose democracy upon Haiti.

Cedras, the head of the army said "Democracy will come to Haiti when the military brings it about."

Inside the country of Haiti everything is quiet. There are no military on the streets. The marketplaces are busy with people buying and selling daily provisions. Our mission is fully functioning.

New Missions is a non-political group of missionaries working in the country of Haiti. We are not for one side or the other. What we desire is stability in Haiti so that we may be about our task of preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The situation in Haiti will pass - sooner or later. When that happens we are glad that we are here to be part of the rebuilding of the nation.


Marcelin Goes Back To School

The Coleman Lamp



• Political Update •

Ever since the intervention began, our skies have been filled with huge transport planes. Helicopters, a dozen at a time, fly overhead. The approach to the airport is over our mission. Planes come in for a landing by the minute.

Our mission is on the Bay of LaGonave. Aircraft carriers, destroyers, cruisers, and a hospital ship are in sight.

On September 18th, a delegation led by Jimmy Carter, signed an agreement with the Haitian government allowing American troops to come ashore unobstructed. Starting on the 19th, a deluge of ships and planes began arriving here in Haiti.

Haitians cluster around us, wherever we go, asking for an explanation to what is happening. They are eager for any news we can give them. For too long Haiti has been oppressed. Men have sought political office only to satisfy their greed for wealth and power. The Haitians consider this intervention to be God's deliverance.

People hurt. The last few months have been especially difficult. The local people have little or no money, and the cost of everything has skyrocketed. A small loaf of bread that cost 40 cents before the embargo now costs \$1.50.

Yet, we have seen an unprecedented move of God's Spirit. Every time we preach another 15-20 people receive the Lord as Saviour.

The Haitian people have always loved us. They love us now, more than ever, because we have been with them in their time of tribulation.

The days ahead will provide the greatest opportunity ever for New Missions to do a work for God. We are here. We have established a base to work from. We can effect this nation for Jesus Christ.

We call upon you to work with us. We need your prayers and your financial support for what God wants to do in Haiti.

Jeanne and I are excited. We have suffered with the Haitian people. Now we rejoice with them. We see the hand of God at work. There is a new day coming for Haiti.

Streaming from every door came the leaders of FRAP. That was October 3rd. One hundred and fifteen leaders of FRAP were arrested and 4000 weapons confiscated.

F.R.A.P. (Front for the Advancement and Progress of Haiti) had been a para military organization that tyrannized the Haitian people. Now the people were free. They took to dancing in the streets.

For us observing from the sidelines, we see American soldiers doing a superb job. They are professional. The military do not exert force where not necessary; yet, everyone knows that they are prepared to exert maximum force if necessary. These men deserve our highest respect.

When we go into the city we enjoy talking with the

American soldiers. They are glad to hear from us who have lived in the country for so long, to learn what the Haitians are thinking.

The soldiers are dressed in heavy combat gear. All of them wear bullet-proof vests and steel chest plates. Needless to say they are hot in the Haitian sun. During the first week of the intervention, the soldiers I spoke with said they had not showered since they landed.

We here at New Missions hope to have some of the troops visit our mission. We would enjoy entertaining them.

Our hopes are high. We see the possibility of a new day for Haiti.

We are excited to be here and to be part of what God is doing. Unprecedented opportunities for evangelism and working with the youth to bring about a new nation based upon the principles of God's Word have come to Haiti.

size patch at the base of his spine oozing from under a green leaf placed on it. We were all taken back by the sight.


Eddy came to our clinic the next day. After an examination, he was sent to the St. Croix Hospital. There he was treated for tuberculosis of the spine.

NEW Missions in Haiti

Dear Friends of Haiti,

December 1, 1994

Tropical Storm Gordon

Late Saturday it started to rain at our mission. That night the rain was torrential. Not having heard the news, we thought it was normal heavy rains. All day Sunday the rains continued. Now we were on our radio net talking with other missionaries in the country, and learned that a tropical storm called "Gordon" was passing slowly over Haiti.

Sunday evening, Dan Hitchcock, one of our missionaries, rushed in our home. "We're being flooded," he said. Unknown to us, the dam controlling the Momasse river had broken, and water came rushing down the mountain onto the Leogane Plain.

The main building at our mission was quickly flooded with two inches of water. Our tool shop had a foot of water. Our newly painted school buildings at Bordmer were full of mud. Our home was surrounded by water. All night, every half-hour, I awoke with a

flashlight to check on the water around our home. We came within two inches from being flooded.

On Monday morning, news reached the mission. Our buildings at Leogane, Bire, Signeau, TiRiviere, LaSalle, and Brache were all okay. The school at Concrab was full of mud. The church section of our building in Masson was down. Five feet of rushing water swept the church away. The temporary school building in Flonc was destroyed. The

clinic, office, food warehouse, training center, and our home were all fine. All in all, we considered ourselves fortunate. No one was hurt.

We have been having our best year of school ever, and we are not going to allow Gordon to hinder or discourage us.

We have a work to do. We will clean up the mess and by God's grace and strength press on to new heights in Him.

Often when in need, I have prayed, "Lord, send an angel." Amazing victory and strength have always followed.


So long as our trust and confidence is in the Lord, we will have victory. Paul said, "We are more than conquerors through Him who loved us." Romans 8:37
